



Colonia Güell

The Colonia Güell, located in Santa Coloma de Cervelló near Barcelona, is a modernist gem and a key site for exploring Antoni Gaudí's architecture. Created in 1890 by Eusebi Güell, it was an industrial colony designed to provide workers with housing, cultural amenities, and improved living conditions. Güell's vision included modernist elements, making the Colonia both functional and innovative.

Its highlight is the unfinished church by Antoni Gaudí, particularly the crypt, which showcases groundbreaking techniques like catenary arches and hyperbolic walls. This masterpiece laid the foundation for Gaudí's Sagrada Família. Other modernist buildings, designed by Gaudí's collaborators, feature distinctive materials like exposed brick, ceramics, and wrought iron. Declared a Cultural Heritage Site in 1991, the Colonia Güell blends architectural significance with historical value, making it an essential destination for modernism enthusiasts.

Casa Viçens

Casa Viçens, located in the Gràcia district of Barcelona, is one of Antoni Gaudí's earliest works and a brilliant example of his distinctive architectural style. Built between 1883 and 1885 as a summer house for the Vicens family, it showcases an eclectic mix of influences, including Moorish, neoclassical, and oriental styles, combined with Gaudí's innovative use of colour and materials.

The building is adorned with intricate ceramic tiles, wrought iron details, and vivid floral motifs inspired by nature. Its design marked a turning point in modernist architecture, setting the stage for Gaudí's later masterpieces. Casa Vicens was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2005 and is now open to the public as a museum, offering visitors a glimpse into the origins of Gaudí's creative genius.

Palau Mojá

A historic building in Barcelona reflecting the lifestyle of the city's high bourgeoisie in the 18th and 19th centuries. Originally owned by Josep de Copons and his wife Maria Luisa Descatllar, it was designed by architect Josep Mas and opened in 1784. The building blends Baroque and French Neoclassical styles, with notable features including the Grand Salon, paintings by Francesc Pla, and the façades. In 1870, the Marquis of Comillas purchased the palace and made renovations, including the Staircase of Honour and the blue, pink, and green salons. After a fire in 1971, it was abandoned until it became the headquarters of the Catalan Government's Cultural Heritage Department.

Bellesguard

Bellesguard, also known as Casa Figueras, is a hidden gem of Antoni Gaudí's work, nestled at the foot of the Collserola hills in Barcelona. Built between 1900 and 1909, it masterfully blends modernist and neo-Gothic styles, drawing inspiration from the site's medieval past as the residence of King Martin I of Aragon. Gaudí's design incorporates natural stone, colorful ceramic mosaics, and an imposing central tower crowned with a cross, embodying both his signature aesthetic and deep historical symbolism.

The house, with its intricate detailing and harmonious integration into the landscape, reflects a fusion of history and innovation. Today, Bellesguard remains a privately owned cultural landmark, offering guided tours that delve into its royal heritage, architectural ingenuity, and Gaudí's unique vision.

Liceu

The El Liceu Grand Teatre, located on Barcelona's famous La Rambla, is one of Europe's most prestigious opera houses and a cultural icon of the city. Founded in 1847, it has a rich history of hosting world-class opera, ballet, and classical music performances. Despite enduring two devastating fires and a bombing, the Liceu has been beautifully restored. Beyond performances, the Liceu invites visitors to explore its history through guided tours, providing a glimpse into the heart of Barcelona's vibrant cultural heritage.

Conference

Private historic properties, whether lived in or run as businesses, play a vital role in shaping our cultural heritage. This year's conference explores their evolving relationship with tourism and heritage designations such as UNESCO status and will dive into how a strategic property management plan can bridge past and future, aligning restoration with long-term vision.

Conference

Gaudí 2026, an event organised by all the owners of Gaudí's works of art

The death of Antoni Gaudí will be commemorated in 2026. All the entities owning works by Antoni Gaudí have come together to organise this commemoration. Within the joint programme, there are two important actions:

- The creation of new routes between Gaudi's works. From the Gaudi Chair, and based on the unpublished research of Galdric Santana, new guided tours have been created based on the interrelationship between his buildings. Based on similarities or contrasts, his works are paired two by two, always linking a well-known work by Gaudí with one that is still unknown. This new way of looking at and explaining Gaudí allows us to understand the architect's genius in a global and rigorous way, while helps us to get to know his most unknown buildings.
- The candidature for UNESCO extension of 6 of Gaudí's works. Casa Botines, the Episcopal Palace of Astorga, the Capricho de Comillas, the Cathedral of Mallorca, Teresianas and Torre Bellesguard have applied for the extension of the UNESCO Declaration, which seven buildings already enjoy (inscriptions made in 1984 and 2005): Park Güell, Palacio Güell, Casa Milá, Casa Vicens, the work of Gaudí on the façade of the Nativity and the crypt of the Sagrada Familia, Casa Batlló and the crypt of the Colonia Güell. Promoted by the Gaudí Chair, and within the framework of the 2026 anniversary, if the extension is accepted, it would make Gaudí the architect with the most works declared World Heritage Sites.

Owners and uses of Bellesguard over the years

Antoni Gaudí's Torre Bellesguard is much more than Gaudí. The land on which it stands has two thousand years of history and has been the scene of crucial moments in the history of Catalonia. All this history, and that of the people who have played a leading role in it, influenced Gaudí in the creation of his work. But the story does not end with Gaudí's building. Gaudí's work has continued to be put to very different uses, adapting its architecture to the function it was to fulfil at any given moment.

From hunting lodge to royal residence, from papal residence to refuge for bandits, from ruins to Gaudí's work, from hospital to home, and from home to house museum. With special mention to this last step, we will explain how the Guilera family decided to open their home to visitors, initiating the adventure towards the cultural management of their heritage gaudiniano. And how Occident subsequently bought Bellesguard in 2018, initiating a new stage in its history, facing the challenges and challenges of the future; such as the drawing up of a Master Plan to carry out global restoration work or the candidacy to be declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Director plan of Torre Bellesguard

Galdric Santana is the Director of the Bellesguard Research Group and has been studying this little-known work by Antoni Gaudí for the last fifteen years. Over these years he has accumulated a large amount of unpublished information that will be made public in 2026, with the publication of the Bellesguard monograph and the dissemination of his research at the Congress on Gaudí to be organised by the Gaudí Chair.

This first-person research and all his knowledge of the building, together with his working methodology, made Galdric Santana the author of the Master Plan for the Bellesguard Tower. Using the latest technological innovations, with a scanning of the whole building by means of point clouds, the use of 3D glasses and a meticulous historical and constructive research, the case of the Bellesguard Master Plan is an example of excellence and the will to do things well. In this conference, will explain in detail what a master plan is, why it is necessary to have one and what are the new technologies applied to the study of heritage.

Sagrada Família

The Sagrada Família is Barcelona's most iconic landmark and a masterpiece of Antoni Gaudí's architectural genius. Construction began in 1882, and the basilica remains under construction, reflecting Gaudí's ambitious vision. Combining Gothic and modernist styles, its design features intricate façades, towering spires, and stunning interiors illuminated by vibrant stained-glass windows.

Declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the Sagrada Família is a symbol of Barcelona and one of the world's most visited monuments, drawing millions of visitors each year to experience its unique beauty and profound significance.

Casa Amatller

Casa Amatller, designed by Josep Puig i Cadafalch, is a standout example of Catalan modernism, blending Romanesque and Gothic elements in a richly symbolic façade. Its iconic stepped gable, inspired by northern European architecture, conceals a photography studio built for the owner, Antoni Amatller. The façade features asymmetrical details, sculptural frames, and motifs like almond branches that reflect Amatller's name and interests, making it one of Barcelona's most distinctive buildings.

Casa Batlló

Casa Batlló, one of Antoni Gaudí's most iconic masterpieces, stands in the heart of Barcelona's Passeig de Gràcia. Redesigned between 1904 and 1906, the building's organic forms, vibrant mosaics, and skeletal balconies reflect Gaudí's imaginative modernist style, inspired by nature and Catalan folklore. Its undulating façade, colorful trencadís (mosaic tiles), and dragon-like roof make it a striking symbol of Barcelona's architectural heritage. Now a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Casa Batlló offers immersive tours showcasing Gaudí's creativity and innovation.

Círculo Ecuestre

The Círculo Ecuestre is an exclusive private club in Barcelona, established in 1856, with a long history of fostering social, cultural, and business connections among its distinguished members. Located in a stately building on Avenida Diagonal, the club is renowned for its elegant interiors, including grand halls, refined dining areas, and spaces dedicated to cultural events and networking.

Over the years, the Círculo Ecuestre has become a symbol of tradition and prestige.



Palau de la Música Catalana

The Palau de la Música Catalana, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is one of Barcelona's most stunning architectural treasures.
